MEMBER SPOTLIGHT: PAUL GROSFIELD

Paul Grosfield came into the world on May 16, 1941. His parents lived in Columbus and made the 40-mile trip to Billings for his birth. Paul had three sisters, Sylvia, Andrea, and Mary, and two brothers Abe and Norman. Norman and Mary are the only remaining family members. Paul's father was a banker at the Stillwater Bank in Rapelje. They moved to Columbus during the depression, and his father brought the bank with him. Their transportation was a 1939 green Studebaker truck and a grey Studebaker car. "I remember those old cars... they looked like a bullet."

Paul's father purchased a ranch in 1948. Approximately 20 horses came with the deal. They broke a few green ones over the years and used the horses to move the cows around the ranch. Initially, they mainly raised Herefords, but later added some Angus. Paul Roos or "Roos" came to the ranch when he was about 11 years old. Roos and Paul became lifelong friends.

Paul started school in Big Timber before moving to Lincoln in 1948, where he finished his elementary education. He worked on the ranch throughout that time. When he turned 15, Paul was fixing a bailer and caught his hand, causing the loss of his little finger. His hand was in bandages for a long while. He just happened to be in a mandatory typing class where he was required to type. He was unable to, however, and received a low grade. Wait – What?

Paul went to high school in Augusta and finished that with a stint at Montana State University in Bozeman where he studied agriculture. He was drafted into the Army and spent two years in special weapons training before returning to Lincoln. He helped his family manage the ranch with the cattle and hay. Over the years, Paul dabbled in logging and had a sawmill.

In 1969, Paul married his sweetheart, Lynn. Together they had two daughters. Sadly, the youngest developed a brain tumor at just 1 ½ years old. With treatment,

she managed to survive for 28 years. You can see on his face that this loss is still painful. His daughter, Heidi, lives in Paradise Valley and manages an Airbnb.

With the horrible flooding that occurred there this year, business slowed down. Heidi has three daughters making Paul a proud grandfather.

In 1970, his friend Roos moved to Lincoln and he and Paul developed a guiding business, working together for nearly 35 years. They taught people from all over the United States and Japan the skills and thrills of fly fishing. Nearly all of this was catch and release, but one year a couple of fellows wanted to mount their catch. They were in Butte and staying at the Finlen Hotel. One side of the building is the hotel and the other is the bar and restaurant. The boys walked to the kitchen with their enormous fish to put it in the refrigerator. On the way, they had to walk by a window looking into the dance area near the bar.

Paul said it was comical when the men on the dance floor saw these two giant fish carried through the hall! The men left the ladies on the dance floor and followed Paul and Roos to the kitchen to admire the fish.

To show their appreciation, the fishermen took Paul and Roos to a nearby soda shop and bought each a small hamburger. They were young men at the time,



and the puny hamburgers hardly filled them up. As soon as they finished eating, Paul and Roos went to the hotel and got real hamburgers. The ones at the hotel were three times the size of the ones at the soda shop. I imagine there are hundreds of stories he can tell.

In 1972, Paul's brother-in-law needed a job, so Paul bought the Husky gas station for him. He ran that for 16 years before going to work for the government. He was later diagnosed with cancer. Sadly he was not able to defeat it. Another tough loss to Paul was his friend Roos, who was taken to his maker by cancer a few years back. Paul had his own fight with cancer and did five rounds of chemo.

He is doing well today – hunting and taking people on fishing trips simply for fun. Paul is a world-class fly fisherman, having guided people down Montana rivers including the Blackfoot, Big Hole, Clark Fork, Missouri, and Smith for many years. He does a few odd jobs around Lincoln and works in his yard. He used to play a little poker for fun – and won some too. He has been coming to the Lincoln Senior Center for a few years. He likes to watch football games on television. His teams are the Bobcats and the Buffalo Bills.

ROCKY'S AGENCY ON AGING INTRODUCES T-CARE FOR FAMILY CAREGIVERS

Caregiving for the elderly is often a responsibility of the family, and the job of caregiving can be daunting. Caregiving can



require constant day-to-day care. This care can also involve situations that may be uncomfortable for a family member to provide for their loved one. Add in the fact that many times the family members tasked with caregiving have other full or part-time jobs, and caregiving can quickly become overwhelming. This can have an impact on the health of the caregiver.

We are here to help! Rocky's Agency on Aging is now offering T-CARE. T-CARE stands for Tailored Caregiver Assessment and Referral. It is a care management system that helps to support families in caregiving roles. T-CARE only requires the completion of a free assessment to enroll.

In addition to T-CARE, Rocky's Agency on Aging offers classes and resource counseling to family caregivers aged 60 and older or for those caregivers who care for someone 60 and older. National changes addressing the needs of family caregivers will also help the clients and caregivers in our sixcounty service area.

According to the Administration for Community Living (ACL), 53 million Americans currently provide unpaid care to an aging loved one or a person with a disability. In response, the ACL published the 2022 National Strategy to Support Family Caregivers on September 21, 2022. This is the first attempt to bring the federal government and the private sector together to address the needs of family caregivers. Accordingly, federal agencies have begun to take action to support family caregivers. For example, the Department of Health and Human Services has changed its definition of a family caregiver. "A family caregiver is an individual who

IF NURSING HOMES DON'T DO IT WHO WILL?

Sometimes people say families should take care of their relatives who require personal care due to aging or disability. However, many older adults or people with disabilities do not have family members. For those who do, their family members often either cannot or will not provide the care. Family caregivers warm the heart, but it's folly to assume everyone has that option.

This myth of the availability of family support is relevant today because Montana is undergoing a radical change. Skilled nursing homes are closing because they cannot afford to stay in business. Medicaid, the health insurance that most frequently pays for nursing home services, does not cover the entire cost of care. Nursing homes used to be able to make up the difference by

charging more to non-Medicaid residents. That's no longer possible with today's changing demographic. According to industry reports, it's common for well over 90% of nursing home residents to be Medicaid users. Therefore 10 of Montana's 61 nursing homes recently shut down permanently. More closures will almost certainly follow soon. Some respond to the nursing home closures by saying that families must do what the nursing homes no longer can. The trouble is family caregiving will never be "the answer." For sure, family care works for some, but not all. Many older Montanans have no families. Those who do, often have families who are not up to the challenges of caring for loved ones at home. Nursing homes provide intensive services that no assisted living can offer. If assisted living cannot do it, it's a safe bet that many families cannot either.

The Commodity Supplemental Food Program (CSFP) is a program where seniors can receive regular allocations of free food every other month. The program guidelines mandate that the person receiving the food must be 60 years of age or older, a resident of Montana, and meet an income requirement. Food typically consists of canned fruit, vegetables, meats, juice, cereals, dry milk, shelf stable milk, cheese, pasta or beans, and peanut butter.

Rocky will have supplemental foods available for Helena-area senior citizens at the Helena Food Share, 1616 Lewis Street, Helena, MT. We are lucky to work with Helena Food Share to make the program more accessible to those individuals picking up the food. There is no charge for the food.



According to multiple newspaper articles and first-hand reports from County Commissioners, state government leaders choose to ignore the Medicaid problem. Instead administrations claim nursing homes are only half-full. They say the nursing home closures are nothing more than a market correction within an industry with more supply than demand. They are not saying or acknowledging that they are using pre-pandemic data that is no longer relevant.

Nursing home residents, the group most in harm's way from COVID-19, used to share rooms. Hardly anyone shares a room in a nursing home today. Social distancing adds another layer of health protection. Comparing pre-pandemic numbers with today's residency makes it look like nursing homes are half empty. However, today's nursing homes are as full as they can be under the new normal created by the pandemic.

In addition, the costs of workers and supplies have increased to the point that nursing homes serve fewer residents than before the pandemic. Put another way, other resources, excluding beds, naturally limit capacity. The workforce and supply shortages also affect home and community-based professional caregivers. Conditions like these are part of the new normal.

All this begs the question. If the government won't do it, and most families cannot, what will happen to those who need care? Sadly, there is no answer to this question other than to point out that Montana lives depend on Medicaid paying its full share.
