Title III funding will be used to support key operational expenses necessary for running our congregate meal programs in Lewis and Clark, Broadwater, and Jefferson counties efficiently.

By strategically utilizing these funds, Rocky aims to sustain and enhance our congregate meal programs, ensuring continued support for older adults who rely on this program. In fiscal year 2024, we provided 20,101 meals to 1,094 older adults. See Attachment A.

Rocky actively collaborates with various community organizations to enhance the effectiveness and reach of our congregate meal programs. Through strategic partnerships, we ensure that Title III funding is maximized to provide comprehensive support for our clients. See Attachment B.

4. Statement of how your project will fulfill the mission of the Older Americans Act. (Include a description of criteria for selection of clients, outreach and targeting activities and how the project fulfills the objectives of the Older Americans Act.)

Rocky's congregate meal programs are committed to upholding the mission of the Older Americans Act (OAA) by providing essential services that promote independence, well-being, and dignity for older adults. Through programs such as congregate dining, Rocky helps prevent unnecessary institutionalization and supports older adults in maintaining active, healthy lives within the Tri-Counties. By fostering strong partnerships with local organizations, healthcare providers, and community resources, Rocky ensures older adults receive the assistance they need to safely age in place with dignity.

No eligible participant is denied service based on their ability or decision not to contribute financially to the program.

Fulfilling the Objectives of the Older Americans Act Rocky's congregate meal program aligns with the key objectives of the Older Americans Act by:

- Providing Nutritional Support: Offering congregate meals that meet USDA dietary guidelines to support older adult health and wellness.
- Promoting Social Engagement: Encouraging participation in senior center activities and boost socialization during meal time at our congregate meal sites.
- Ensuring Access to Services: Collaborating with Rocky's Agency on Aging, healthcare providers, and local organizations to connect older adults with essential resources such as transportation, healthcare, and financial assistance.

By implementing these strategies, Rocky's congregate meal program upholds the mission of the Older Americans Act, ensuring older adults in the Tri-Counties receive the support and services needed to lead healthy, independent lives.

5. If extra funding was available, what would you do to increase services and how would you plan to spend the money?

The increased request for funding will help in defraying the continually increasing cost and delivery of food products for the program.

Extra funding will also be needed to support the program as other community funding sources decline (County Mill, CSBG, etc.).

Tri-County Nutrition Program

Congregate Meals

Expenditures – Please note all expenditures are projected based upon actual expenditures in prior years and the estimated expenses for FY26.

Personnel and fringe benefits for employees working at six different locations include:

- 1) Wages based on projected FY26 include 14 employees working full and part-time for a total of 12,237 hours or an equivalent of 5.88 FTEs. Many of the employees work intermittently as substitutes when regular full or part-time employees are absent.
- 2) Fringe benefits: FICA at 7.65%; workers' compensation of 1.53% for kitchen and delivery personnel; and unemployment insurance at 1.60%;
- 3) Health and life insurance benefits equal to \$1075.00 per month for a full-time employee;
- 4) Employee Assistance Program at \$45.84 for all employees; and,
- 5) A pension plan contribution of 3% calculated on gross wages paid.

Supplies include projected expenses for minor equipment, office, meal service supplies and other supplies.

Raw food and meals include the projected expenses for groceries and Rocky Mountain Development Council, Inc. (Rocky) Consolidated Kitchen charges.

Commodities include expenses for groceries received through the Commodities Program.

Communications include projected expense for phone service (lines, long distance phone calls = \$1,523.64), postage (\$150), and internet and computer network fees (\$13,095.68).

Repairs and maintenance expenses consist of maintenance to equipment and tools.

Travel and trainings costs include senior bus transportation to the Daily Dinner Club in Helena which is the majority of the expense, mileage for staff when using personal vehicles, and some travel related to training.

Building Space: costs consist of rent and/or utility charges for the programs residing in Helena and the leases in Augusta, Townsend, Lincoln, and Whitehall.

Insurance costs are related to general commercial liability, automobile liability, and excess umbrella liability policies.

Audit fees are prorated among all Rocky programs based upon program expenses and the auditor's time allotted to the programs. Rocky is subject to an annual audit because many of the programs, including the Tri-County Nutrition Program, receive federal and state funding.

Other costs include such items as indirect costs, advertising and photo copies.

It is significant to note that Rocky has a provisional indirect cost rate of 13.9% that is negotiated with our cognizant agency, the Department of Public Health and Human Services, which we currently charge. The rate is applicable to all Rocky programs and is calculated based upon total program expenses (less any exclusions). Indirect cost allocations pay for the program support provided by the administrative, human resources, and fiscal departments.

Resources

Area IV Funds include all federal and state funds requested to support the congregate meals program in the Counties of Lewis & Clark, Jefferson, and Broadwater.

Project Income includes revenues from the suggested meal contributions.

Other funding resources include a minor amount from fundraising from private sources and in-kind revenue.

Cash in Lieu and Commodities represent federal funding received from the Department of Public Health and Human Services in groceries and in cash.

Match County Mill funding for congregate meals from Lewis and Clark, Broadwater and Jefferson Counties.

Congregate Meals

Statement of how your project will coordinate services with other community programs. (Include a description of referral systems)

Rocky's congregate meal program aims to provide older adults in the Tri-County area with access to hot, nutritious weekday meals while promoting overall health. These meals meet one-third of daily dietary requirements, as outlined by the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Older adults who are able are encouraged to participate at any of Rocky's seven congregate meal sites, located in Augusta, Boulder, Helena, Lincoln, Townsend, Whitehall, and Helena Indian Alliance (H.I.A).

Rocky's congregate site staff ensures that no individual aged 60 or older is denied a meal due to an inability or decision not to contribute toward the cost. The program is available to those 60 and older, with a suggested contribution of \$5.00 per meal.

The program's focus on nutrition and social engagement aligns with the mission of the Older Americans Act, which seeks to promote independence among older adults and prevent unnecessary and costly institutionalization.

To maximize participation, congregate meal sites collaborate with various community providers and other Rocky services. We work closely with organizations serving older adults, such as clinics, hospitals, Adult Protective Services, the VA, and affordable older adult housing. Outreach efforts also extend to local food pantries and human service offices within the Tri-County area. Rocky both receives referrals from these agencies and connects potential clients with appropriate services. Additionally, we partner with Rocky's Senior Programs, including Rocky's Agency on Aging, Senior Companion Program, Retired and Senior Volunteer Program, and Foster Grandparent Program.

Rocky staff continues to explore various strategies to promote congregate meal sites, including keeping local newspapers and reporters informed, inviting Commodity Supplemental Food Program recipients to visit their local congregate meal site during distribution, emailing the V.O.E. to agencies serving older adults, visiting senior living communities, and encouraging current participants to spread the word about the program.

Building and maintaining positive relationships with every older adult who participates in our congregate meal sites has proven essential. A positive experience not only encourages return visits but also inspires participants to invite others who might not have otherwise joined.

By cultivating strong partnerships and maintaining an efficient referral system, we enhance the support and services available to our older adult participants.

I am honored to write a letter of support for Rocky's nutrition programs and the proposal for continued and future funding of these programs.

My support and my experience comes from three different perspectives.

- 1. Professional Role: I was a program manager for nutrition programs at the Montana State Office On Aging from 2013 to 2022. I was able to visit senior centers across the state but also knew at the statewide and federal level how the nutrition programs and support services were so crucial to seniors. I also became keenly aware of the level of importance and support these programs provided to keep our seniors within their home and if not at home, within their community. I also provided oversight for the Senior Farmers Market nutrition Program (statewide) of which Helena participated. I saw firsthand the struggle that many of our seniors, who depend solely on social security. They talked about the challenge of purchasing and preparing nutritious foods or the ability to put together a nutritious or well-balanced meal independently. Rocky provides the alternative via congregate meals and home delivered meals. It also provides through the senior center, a social outlet, educational opportunities and wellness as added enticements to keep us all engaged.
- 2. Watching out for our elderly: After I retired from the state, I was involved with an elderly neighbor who lost his home due to a fire (next door to me) and suffered some physical impairment as a result. I reached out to Meals on Wheels to provide meals for him in his temporary home. The biggest benefit I saw was that not only did he get meals but there came a time when he had fallen in his house and couldn't get back up. He could not reach the phone to call the ambulance. If it had not been for the Meals On Wheels Volunteer coming to the door and hearing him call out, he could have passed away....alone. This scenario ended well for him and I am forever thankful for that volunteer. We have all heard these stories and that is one of my biggest fears for many of our seniors that live alone and may not have close family, neighbors or friends that look in on them. Prior to this mishap, I was approached by other neighbors and families about your services, especially the meals on wheels and we were able to get assistance for other elderly folks that lived in my neighborhood. It's funny how sometimes we can live in these neighborhoods and not notice the needs of others until an event happens. I am thankful that Rocky is there.
- 3. **Personal Recipient** Due to a recent accident limiting my mobility and the "threat" of not being able to return home due to this, I became a recipient of your meals on wheels. I am fairly independent and have a problem with asking for help but felt I needed to practice

what I had been preaching to other families and signed up. I appreciated the meals that I had delivered 3X a week but mostly appreciated the smile and the greeting at the door by the delivery person. I am one of the lucky seniors who have a great network of friends and a family member in town, but I still felt some isolation and frustration with the mobility issue. As I said, I'm stubborn, independent and have a hard time reaching out. I am sure you know quite a few seniors like this.

I have returned to the world of Aging through this intervention and visited with Mindy recently and relayed this info to her. At that time, I signed up as a member and hope to (when things calm down) be of service to the senior center and their nutrition programs. Without these services and the funding to do so, this would limit the lifeline for many of the seniors that do take full advantage of your programs within the Helena and outlying areas.

For these reasons, I hope you consider continuing the funding that these programs.
